

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT OCT 2018

The Committee met for the first time this year on Saturday 22 Sept., with a substantial agenda. The minutes are attached. There were, however some important issues. The committee has agreed to proceed with the Wild Apricot project which will cost the club an additional \$500 per year, once the present web site is cancelled. (since the service is paid in USD the actual amount will vary, but the intention is to pay 12 months in advance to have a 10% discount, which will also avoid currency fluctuations.) Our membership is holding up well with 60 ordinary and associate members and a further 40 family members. The committee recommends that we hold the Christmas Party at Mudgeeraba Bowls Club and the matter will be discussed at the October breakfast meeting. This will save us imposing on the hospitality of members. Gordon and Jenny made the offer again this year, but they have hosted the event on a number of occasions in the past and it would be unfair to impose on them again. Our \$5,000 deposit with Heritage Bank has been re-invested at 2.7% after a long winded exercise to avoid paying withholding tax (\$62.05) Have a look at the meeting minutes for other matters discussed.

Sunday's ride to Kenilworth was a mixed bag. Those who made the whole ride had a great time. Unfortunately, Mike and I were left behind at Samford and had an early and unexpected ride home. Gordon & Jenny waited for a few minutes before leaving and lost contact with the main group, so made their own way to Kenilworth. We have discussed ride rules many times, but there is no reason why any rider should be left behind at any time. A missing rider may have suffered an accident or been delayed by some unforeseen circumstance. We ride as a group to provide each other with support and have an obligation to look out of each other. Ken has offered to repeat the ride and we will hold him to that.

Gordon has decided to give up the position of ride co-ordinator after many years, so the search for a replacement is on. Gordon has been with the club since its creation and has been an active member for all of that time. He was treasurer for about 10 years and has been ride co-ordinator for as long as any of us can remember. So, many thanks to Gordon and Jenny for their contribution. They will, of course, continue to ride regularly.

We still have no volunteer for the newsletter editor position, which is important to the club as a communication tool and as a source of income. Without it we will be in financial difficulties. So, please think about it. The editor does not have to be a full member, but anyone who has a few hours per month to contribute

- Corner markers
- If separated meet at destination and at least send message to ride leader or someone in the group

These are all sensible suggestions and perhaps our incoming ride coordinator could address these. Other riding groups and clubs have good systems in place and we should try these as they are well tried and used.

Well that's yer lot for this month, Ride safe and keep the shiny side up.

Club Ride Rules

Never pass the ride leader.

To be considered as riding with the group, you should be between the ride captain and the tail-end Charlie. (TEC) TEC hasn't got eyes in the back of their head. When riding in staggered formation, the formation is set by the rider behind the ride captain. When the formation changes, please take care. It is not advised to merely move across. Move across if safe to do so.

The rider behind the ride captain corner marks. Do it safely. Try to be in vision of the riders that you are directing. Do not endanger yourself by stopping in loose gravel, or in a place where you may be hit. Tail End Charlie will wave you to re-join the group as he/she approaches you. Again, do it safely. Join only when you think it is appropriate. If TEC is being followed by traffic, pull in behind the traffic and make your way back to the ride. If it's not safe to pull in front of TEC, don't. Use common sense. Keep safe distance at all times.

Advise the ride captain and tail end Charlie if you are leaving the ride before the 'good-bye' point. Be fully fuelled before the ride [The bike guys, the bike]

It is not easy to keep a head count of riders. If you think someone is missing and should not be, ask. It's always better to be safe than sorry.

Never pass on the left; never tail-gate, pass slower riders only when it is safe to do so; be patient.

Abide by the road rules at all times.

Classic BMW wins at Goodwood.

HISTORIC SUCCESS FOR BMW MOTORRAD CLASSIC AND A FANTASTIC SPECTACLE.

At the Goodwood Revival, Troy Corser and Herbert Schwab astride the BMW R 57 Kompressor won the overall placings in the race for the Barry Sheene Memorial Trophy for the first time – Off the race track, BMW Group Classic also recalled the 1950s and 1960s with a glamorous vehicle fleet and period backdrop to match the era.



Munich/Goodwood. The man in the suit looked surreptitiously around all the classic cars, then he slowly opened the left-hand side of his jacket – lots of pocket watches were dangling inside his jacket. "Special price, special price", he murmured to the astonished onlookers. . . Scenes like this are typical for the Goodwood Revival Meeting: It's a spectacle from start to finish.

Every guest is part of the drama at the annual rendezvous around the Goodwood Circuit and on the race track located in southern England. Genuine performers, professional racing drivers and innumerable mechanics revive an era of motor sport that has long since passed into the annals of history. This year once again, more than 150 000 visitors took a trip down memory lane and enjoyed some 360 automobiles and 30 motorcycles on the race track, along with the numerous heritage treasures waiting to be admired.

Classic motorcycles from BMW Motorrad were put through their paces on the race track and demonstrated that they should certainly not be consigned to the scrap heap. Australian racing legend Troy Corser achieved some impressive records and a historic triumph. On the BMW R 57 Kompressor, he and Herbert Schwab won the overall placings as they competed for the traditional Barry Sheene Memorial Trophy. Already in the first race on the Saturday, the duo crossed the finishing line in third place after a false start and a subsequent spectacular pursuit. In the second race on the Sunday, Corser and Schwab even succeeded in passing the chequered flag as winners. This enabled them to come out on top in the overall placings when the two results were put together. This was the first overall win for BMW Group Classic at the Goodwood Revival.

The sensational performance of the BMW R 57 Kompressor was complemented with a further tour de force by Corser. The two-times Superbike World Champion rode the fastest lap of the entire weekend and simultaneously achieved the best lap time ever ridden on the Goodwood Circuit with a classic motorcycle. The other teams also made their contribution to the exceptionally successful appearance by BMW Motorrad Classic in Goodwood. Maria Costello and Claus Clausen riding the second BMW R 57 Kompressor came tenth when they competed in the race on the Sunday. In the same race, Klaus Ottillinger and Sebastian Gutsch rode their BMW R 5 to fourth place.

The races for the Barry Sheene Memorial Trophy recall the "BMCRC 1000cc Scratch Race" in which grand prix bikes, slightly modified road motorcycles and specials battled for victory on "Motor Cycling Goodwood Saturday" in 1951. At the Goodwood Revival in 2018, historic automobiles also competed in a trial of strength emulating an old tradition. The entrants included an Austin Mini Cooper S Competition and a BMW 1800 TI/SA. They even took part in the same race for the "St. Marys Trophy", named after the bend with the most action on the 3.8 kilometre Goodwood circuit. They were competing with

lots of other classic Minis, a veritable horde of Ford Lotus Cortina's, Alfa Romeo 1600 GTA coupés and Jaguar Mark II saloons. The drivers lived up to their reputation and delighted the public gallery. The races are not show acts – nobody wants to be overtaken here even if there is only fame and honour to be gained.

The classic Mini heralded the entry into motor sport for a host of drivers who subsequently became successful professionals – names like Lauda, Hunt and Stewart are associated with the car. There again the "Rally Professor" Rauno Aaltonen – who subsequently went on to become head of BMW driver training – achieved his biggest successes in the diminutive British car. The BMW 1800 TI/SA is one of those cars that allowed the make to prove its potential in touring-car racing during the 1960s. The 1.8 litre four-cylinder engine powering the saloon in the road-going version generated 110 hp, while two twin carburettors and higher compression in the motor-sport guise of the "Special" – "Sonderausführung – (SA) increased the power to 130 hp to allow a top speed of up to 190 km/h.

Alongside the racing events on the Goodwood Circuit, BMW Group Classic fascinated the public with the acclaimed BMW 507 once owned by Elvis Presley, a rare BMW 503 convertible and an open-top Rolls-Royce Silver Cloud. The vehicles were presented entirely in the style of the 1950s and 1960s. A replica of the traditional London motor-car dealer Kevill-Davies & March was set up not far from the race track.

Our ride was planned to take us to The Great Western Hotel in Glenn Innes, via mostly gravel roads, where we were going to spend the night before joining the other adventure riders at the Green Valley Farm in Tingha on Saturday morning.


Ken lead us out towards Beaudesert, Rathdowney where we turned left on Newman Road and soon we were on gravel roads. We followed Garney's Creek Road, Mount Wilson road and the White Swamp Road before a short run on bitumen on the Mount Lindsay Hwy. We hit the dirt again on Tooloom Road running through Toolom Nat. Park, before joining Paddy's Flat Road running

through Yabba State Forest. Clarence Way road took us into Grafton for lunch. A great ride so far with beautiful views and hardly any traffic, although a bit dusty in some places.

After lunch we had another short run on bitumen before hitting the Old Glenn Innes road outside Grafton. The Old Glenn Innes (Old Grafton Road) runs for approx. 130 km until 35 km outside Glenn Innes. Almost all the way is well maintained gravel road. It is a very scenic road running alongside the river for a long time, and being a Friday there was almost no traffic so it should have be an easy ride; well that was until the little G650X and myself suddenly were lying on the ground facing in the opposite direction going into a soft left hand corner. What can I say? I am no Toby Price.

Anyway, Steve was just behind me and got me back on my feet again without any damage except for a broken mirror bracket (\$41.00 form Team Moto). I must say that I am impressed with Ian on the big 1200GSA, riding on road tyres as if he was out on a Sunday ride, well done.



KENILWORTH RIDE 23 SEPT

Ken Madsen's Perspective

The weather gods couldn't have been more accommodating for this ride.

I met the Gold Coast contingent at McDonalds Jindalee right on agreed time and after a quick air check by James, we headed off.

All up 10 people on 9 bikes all keen to ride and see some of my back yard. We had done this ride before and I felt under pressure to find a few new roads to mix things up, well we did and it was a great fun ride.

Rather than do Mr Nebo, it was decided to do a quick coffee at Samford so we could make up some time as the ride was going to be quite a long one.

The coffee shop whilst good, took a bit too long and that's where we made our first error. On leaving we didn't count the riders and assumed everyone was there. We had lost our El Presidente, probably left in the in demand under catered for toilet facilities.

Gordon and Jenny were TEC and, as usual did a magnificent iob.

Corner marking was a concern and some riders got missed. There are some standard procedures for corner marking and these will be addressed soon.

On to Dayboro we rode. However after Woodford, there is one

corner in the area where they have done massive retaining works that catches everyone, I knew it was coming up and was out wide and in first and yet I still got close to the centre line. This is a trap for young players but at least we all managed it OK.

Postman's track and through to Conondale are a must do and we did.

By this stage we had made contact with Gordon and they were cooling their heels at Kenilworth. That was our lunch destination and I think the pub food satisfied everyone, my Steak sandwich was excellent.

Having gained 2 missing riders back into the ride group, it was off along Obi Obi Road and through Montville and Melany. Of course I went straight when I should have gone left so took next left only to need to do a u turn...well what's a ride without at least one u turn. Coming out of Maleny I had experienced a side road with the BMW training team and it's definitely a road less travelled, by this stage we were using corner markers, with a quick left and then a right onto Bald Knob Road. It's only 10-15km long, but it's a beauty. We were heading back toward Mt Mee, but the map had said I could use Commissioner Flat Road from Peachchester, definitely a nice run and it got us back onto the Kilcoy Maleny road. Rather than go back through Woodford, there was a dirt section of road that runs through some stunning farm areas near Neurum Creek. Off we went and whilst the dust might have annoyed some at the back, Vidoni Road was easy and cut out a big Woodford/D'Aguilar corner. We popped out just before the winding uphill toward MT Mee. From there a simple run back to Debora for a water and fuel for those that needed it.


Normally, the Gold Coast contingent would have gone do the Bruce Highway from say Landsborough, but afternoon traffic is always thick and I had suggested the way home via Centenary Highway and Logan Motorway would be a similar time and much more enjoyable. The group continued on as I took the Oxley exit.

My bike was parked at 4:30 and had done 365km, so I am guessing it was 5:30- 6 for the GCer's and at least 450 to 500km all up.

All in all a good ride but some weaknesses were exposed regarding corner marking and these will be addressed with the new ride coordinator over the next few weeks or so.

SAFETY COMMENT

Dave Huddy

Edge filtering for motorcycles is one of those good improvements we have all appreciated, especially on the M1 on a Sunday afternoon returning from a ride, but as usual it come with a long list of regulations.

The MRAQ has had a lengthy discussion with Transport Regulation Branch, Department of Transport and Main Roads, about the application of the rules in a situation where a road which has a posted speed limit of 90 km an hour or more, has a variable illuminated speed sign of less than 90 km an hour.

The wording for the edge filtering road rules has now been amended to allow edge filtering even though there is a reduction in speed limit. The department provides the following example:-

The speed limit for a length of road is 100km/h. A variable illuminated message sign indicates a speed limit of 80km/h for the length of road. In the circumstances, it is lawful for the rider to edge filter along the length of road.

It is worth while reading through this advice from Department as it sets out the conditions where filtering is permissible and where it's not. One notable regulation is that when filtering a rider may not exceed 30 km/h and we do often see riders exceeding this limit. Also, edge filtering in tunnels is not permitted.

I have attached the full schedule of rules. It's worth a few minutes to read it through.

151BEdge filtering past slow or stationary vehicles on a motorbike

- (1) The rider of a motorbike is **edge filtering** along a length of road if the motorbike enters the edge of the road while the rider is passing 1 or more vehicles on the road.
- (2)The rider of a motorbike must not unlawfully edge filter along a length of road.

Maximum penalty—20 penalty units.

- (3)For subsection (2), if 1 or more of the following circumstances apply while a rider is edge filtering along a length of road, the rider is taken to have unlawfully edge filtered along the length of road—
- (a)the rider does not hold an O type licence for the class of the motorbike;
- (b)the speed limit for the length of road, other than indicated by a variable illuminated message sign, is less than 90km/h;

Example for paragraph (b)—


The speed limit for a length of road is 100km/h. A variable illuminated message sign indicates a speed limit of 80km/h for the length of road. In the circumstances, it is lawful for the rider to edge filter along the length of road.

- (c)the rider rides at a speed of more than 30km/h;
- (d)the length of road is in a tunnel;
- (e)there are roadworks on the length of road;
- (f)the rider rides on any unsealed part of the road;
- (g) it is not safe to edge filter.
- (4)In this section—

edge, of a length of road-

- (a)means the part of the road that is-
- (i)to the left of the left edge line on the road; or
- (ii)to the right of the right edge line on the road; and
- (b)includes an emergency stopping lane along the road.

The amended rules came into effect on **7 September 2018**. The Road Rules Regulation has not been consolidated / updated on the Queensland Legislation Database quite as yet, but you will find evidence of the new amending regulation being passed by accessing: https://www.legislation.qld.gov.au/browse/asmade#/sl/year/2018 Then click on the entry titled: Transport Legislation Amendment Regulation (No. 2) 2018.

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BMW Motorrad Motorsport - BMW Racers are successful all around the globe

The FIM Endurance World Championship (the legendary 24hour race Bol d'Or) held at Le Castellet, France, saw BMW Team GERT56 (S1000RR) bring home the Superstock class win after 688 laps. In the overall standings, the rider trio of Julian Puffe, Sefan Kerschbaumer and Filip Altendorfer finished as the best BMW team in a superb sixth place. Mercury Racing also secured a top-ten position with the #21 BMW \$1000RR. A total of seven BMW teams contested the 82nd edition of the Bol d'Or.

At the MOTUL FIM Superbike World Championship at Portimao, Portugal, Gulf Althea BMW Team Rider Loris Baz finished his best result of the season in sixth place then in race two in ninth place.

Then Roberto Tamburini of Berclaz Racing claimed his first win of the season, setting a new lap record on his BMW S1000RR at the FIM Superstock 1000 European Championship at Portimao. His win saw him clinch the manufacturer's title for BMW. In the seven races of the season so far, a BMW rider has stood on the top step of the podium five times. Markus Reiterberger (alpha Racing-Van-Zon-BMW) finished in third place thereby extending his lead in the championship standings.

In the British Superbike Championship at Oulton Park, Great Britain, the best-placed BMW rider in the first of the two Superbike class races in fifth was Michael Laverty (Tyco BMW Motorrad).

In the two Superstock class races, BMW riders celebrated a one-two-three result and picked up a total of five podium places. In race one, Keith Farmer (Tyco BMW Motorrad) and Alex Olsen (ASTRO-JJR Racing) finished in second and third place. In the second race, all three spots on the podium went to BMW S1000R racers.

BMW riders in the SuperBike Series Brazil at Goiania also enjoyed a successful weekend. In the first race, Alex Barros and Danilo Lewis both finished on the podium in second and third respectively. In race two, Lewis scored his first win of the season whilst Barros finished third.

BMW riders picked up a win and a total of seven podium places at the Malaysia Superbike Championships at Sepang in both the Superbike and Superstock class.


